Postscript #1.

Sometime between 1831-1841 an English painter was in Texas who specialized in miniatures - popular at the time (Dr. D.C. Hawley called the miniature and the artist) He painted a miniature of John. One was done subsequently of Jane - not by the same artist and not as professional.

These miniatures were back to Trochad. Dad thought perhaps "Uncle Alex" may have procured them for the Windsor Hennessey family, when he came to N.S. for The Squire's wedding to Mary Smith in 1899.

This may be wrong for Aunt Margaret mentioned in a letter from South Africa that they were in the house when she was a girl and she always liked them.

Whatever - when Aunt Mary died in 1943 they were packed up and sent out to Aunt Margaret Cameron in South Africa - and they got there safely in spite of U-boats & what not during the war.

Aunt Margaret died in 1949.

Faughan Cameron packed them up and sent them to Dad in 1953, over 100 years after they had been painted in N.S.

Jane's son Alan has them now.
